Student Welfare

Included in this newsletter is a letter from the Prime Minister Mr Scott Morrison regarding student welfare. As a school we will be taking part in the National Day of Action against Bullying and Violence on Friday, 15th March, 2019. The National Day of Action is an important opportunity for the whole community to reject bullying and cyberbullying and help keep our students safe. Please read below on how you can keep your children safe from cyberbullying.

Three steps to protecting your kids online

- 1. **Communicate openly with your kids** it's not impossible to supervise your kids 24/7, so finding ways to establish and maintain trust is really valuable.
- Use technology tools to keep them safe there are so many technological advances that can enhance the experience for your child online and help keep them safe, both within the site of app and for their devices



3. Encourage safe and responsible behaviour – setting rules for your child's internet use and establishing clear boundaries and expectations is imperative. Your rules will depend on the age of your children and the level of responsibility you are willing to give but is underpinned by conversation, education and trust.

School Opal Card

As part of our campaign against fare evasion, and our on-going commitment to provide the level of service needed to transport students to and from your school, Busways conducts regular checks of School Opal card.

All students must be in possession of a valid Opal card or pay a fare.

Students in possession of an Opal card must also tap on/off with their card when boarding our buses.

This is important, because the Opal data collected determines the level of service we are able to provide to your school. If students don't tap on and off, the services will appear underutilised and may be considered for cancellation based on low passenger numbers.

Students who are ineligible for School Opal will need to purchase a Child/Youth Opal card or pay a fare to travel on our buses.

Respectful communication is a right

In all workplaces people have the right to feel respected. Unacceptable and offensive behaviour has no place in our school communities.

To ensure the wellbeing of students, staff and the community in our schools, steps will be taken to address unacceptable behaviour. This may include restricting contact with the school community or, in more serious cases, referral to NSW Police.

Unacceptable behaviour may include but is not limited to:

- · Aggressive or intimidating actions, such as violence, threatening gestures or physical proximity.
- Aggressive or intimidating language, including the use of obscenities, making sexist, racist or derogatory comments or using a rude tone.
- Treating members of the school community differently due to aspects such as their religion or disability.
- Inappropriate and time wasting communication.

Ethics in the infant years

Ethics classes in years K-2 focus on developing core skills such as listening to others, raking turns to speek and giving reasons. Stories, poorns and rhymos primpt children lo discuss ethical issues such as hurling someone without meaning to, teling the truth, being knd, torgiving, ownership, faimess and empathy.

Cur skills-based topics for this age group include asking and answering questions, disagreeing, changing your mind, working out what is true, giving and evaluating reasons as well as giving exemplea and counter exemples. Fogic is also infroduced, with topics fouching on inductive inference and deductive reasoning

Ethics has added a real cohesiveness to our school. There's a strong sense of children working and playing together. - Principal, Paramatia Hagion

Ethics in the primary years

In years 3–6, oth as students develop their official thinking and discussion based skills. Storics, contemporary issues and roal life scenarios form the basis of discussions on efficient issues such as selfishmess, how we should treat living things, promises, greed, friendship, chesting, voting, puntishment, homelessness, teasing and failmess in society. Skila-based topics for this age group include responsibility generalising, proving dairing, things out, wildlity, generalising, proving dairing, structuring arguments, identifying incorrect cone usions, identifying taufty reasoning, ovaluating the strength of evidence and thinking about thinking. Primary signal students are encouraged to develop their community of inclury skills by asking each other well thought out questions and challenging cach thought out questions and challenging cach other's arguments.

Enrolling your child

Ethics classes run weekly during the school year within the Special Teligious Education/Special Education in Ethics (SRE/SEE) times of.

Primary Ethics classes are free of charge

If you'd like your child to attend ethics classes, advise the school office via a note on email. Your child can start as scon as an ethics teacher a available and eight or more students have condicd in a class.

Become a volunteer

Ethics classes are taught by specially trained voluntoors who are often parents, grandparents or numbers of the incoacer community locking to give some of their time to a worthy cause. Becoming an ethics coordinator or ethics teacher can be a very rewarding way to be involved in your school community. Voluntoor othics toachors are alweys needed to ensure that there are adequate bases for meet demand. Experience a not required, as comprehensive training and access to lesson materials is provided.
